Course Description

From the Catalog – Basic concepts such as graphics systems, modeling, and pipelines are introduced. Students also will learn to program in a popular graphics library, such as OpenGL or DirectX. Topics include basic 2-D and 3-D graphics programming, basic animation and controls, texture mapping, lights, and materials. Prerequisites: CIS 302.

Specific Course Goals

- Understand basic concepts of 2D and 3D computer graphics.
- Get familiar with current graphics libraries including OpenGL, DirectX, and extensions.
- Design and implement 2D/3D graphics scenes using Three.js, a 3D library for the Web.

- Week 13 – 15. Textures. 3D web projects. Custom shaders/render/physics/sound if time.
